

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

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High Country

November 3 - 12 2000

Day 1 - Adelaide to Walhalla

6.00am meeting at Crafers with a fine clear morning. The trip consisted of a mix of 4WD members from the Toyota and Mt. Lofty Clubs and a mix of different vehicles. Six vehicles set out consisting of Mt Lofty members and trip leaders Greg, Scott (Greg's son) and the navigator Ted (80 series Toyota), Jeff (Jeep Cherokee) my only concern was tyre selection, but I have been told it never rains on Ted's trips. From Toyota, Mal (Club president 60 Series Toyota), John (Discovery), Phil & Don (Prado). First stop was Bordertown for a coffee break stop to pick up Malcolm Butler from Port Augusta (75 series). The aim was to get to Melbourne early enough to miss the Friday afternoon traffic.

We got to the Westgate Bridge at 3.00pm and the traffic was already in chaos, it took 1.5 painful hours to get through Melbourne, with some slick manoeuvring and radio communication the group managed to stay together. George and Danny (GU Nissans) from Mt Lofty club were leaving Adelaide later and were in for a rude surprise as they would be in Melbourne at about 5.00pm, who would want to commute through this every day? 

Greg and Ted. As we waited we were covered in a canopy of tree ferns in the creek bed, we all contemplated work but this passed quickly, in a flash actually.

We decided to walk up to Greg and Ted to investigate the problem. A large tree over the track had stopped their progress, and in a attempt to manoeuvre Greg's vehicle had its back end in the creek and could not move. After a group meeting it was decided it would be tight but all vehicles should make it under the obstacle. Out with the turfer winch and hand winch, Greg under the tree, for those not used to hand winching it was a fast learning curve. Danny's Nissan next and as he got half way through a slide sideways found his roof rack about 25mm clear of the tree, the only option was to remove the rack completely. Eventually through the same procedure was need for George's vehicle, we now know who has the heaviest roof rack.

Then each vehicle one by one, Phil (Prado) caught up in creek on rock and had to be extracted. Mal (60 Series) could not get enough traction and had to be towed to the top of the hill 1.5kms by Greg. By the time we got all vehicle through 4 hours had passed.

Above Fulton Creek, a message came back not to proceed any further as another difficult steep slippery hill had been encountered.

George (Nissan) had been sent up first to see how far he could make it up, in attempt he made it 30% way up and then slid backwards 30 metres. As those in the back of the convoy walked over the problem hill, Ted, Greg and George were attempting to secure George's vehicle to the nearest tree. As George had a motorised winch it was decided to get him to the top then reassess the situation, going back from where he was would have been precarious. After a lot of work getting the Nissan to the top, and most of the group slightly weary it was decided to use the Nissan to tow the next vehicle up and reassess the situation.
