(Part 2 of The Port River Cruise)

After a lunch break, the remainder of the group met out the front of the Maritime Museum. After a quick visit to the Chocolate Shop (with home-made chocolate, fudge and gourmet ice-creams) we headed in to see what is a lovely collection of fine old relics and reproductions of times gone past. It was a real eye-opener to see on the first exhibit, the SS Active II, the amount of space on a cargo ship in the early 1900's. If any of us cooks start complaining about the size of our kitchens, we need only be reminded of the dark, hot and confined area the cook had on this ship. It would have been no more than 2 metres square!!!

We then headed through the "Food Glorious Food" exhibition with the excellent examples of the rations available on most voyages for our immigrants. A small serve of lentils, tea, coffee & rice were weekly allowances, only the pregnant women got a more generous serving and they were most grateful for the good food on board! There was examples of old "parlour" games, e.g. air hockey (very old fashioned compared to today's standards), put the ball in the clowns mouth, etc. From there we saw artefacts from ship wrecks off South Australian waters, medals, diary pages, pieces of the ship, there was even a anchor from one ship.

The children enjoyed the "Octopus's Garden" exhibit, where they could dress up as a sea creature, walk through the garden, and drive a yellow submarine. There was another area where they could make a paper boat with step by step instructions on how to fold it and the paper supplied as well. This mother made one for her daughter, but needed assistance as I couldn't work several of the last steps out – Thanks Jenny.

The lower level of the museum is actually the original ground level of Port Adelaide. They have concreted most walk areas but have left lots of areas in their original sand/rock condition as to show that Pt Adelaide has risen from the ground up literally. Also on this level

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they showed sleeping quarters for passengers on board different ships. Some were quite adequate, but others were made from wooden benches with hessian bags for blankets! They would have been smaller than most single beds and 2 people slept in each section! (I hope pregnant women weren't subjected to that!)

When everyone had finished in the museum our entry ticket also included a visit through the lighthouse on the wharf. After 70 steps up and a very small man hole at the top, the view was definitely worth the effort. You could see Adelaide city, up the Pt River where we had been for our cruise several hours earlier, and out to sea.

Overall, the day was most enjoyable and a very interesting insight into the history of Pt Adelaide and how some of our immigrants got to our shores.

Many thanks to Jane & Charlie for yet again organising another fabulous day trip for the club.

THE COORONG NATIONAL PARK 4WD - Fishing - Camping - Bird Watching

What is the Coorong National Park?

The Coorong (46745ha) lies adjacent to the mouth of the River Murray and consists of a long, shallow, saline lagoon more than 100km in length separated from the Southern Ocean by the sand dunes of the Young Husband Peninsula. The Southern end of the Cocrong is fringed by a series of shallow ephemeral salt lakes. The coastal and unusual aquatic habitats of the Coorong form a wetland of international importance under the Ramsar Convention.

Guidelines and laws to help us protect and enjoy the Coorong

- Drive only on marked tracks (between the orange posts).
- $\sqrt{}$ Long term damage can occur if a single vehicle ventures off track, uprooting and destroying the vegetation. (Fines \$100 -\$1,000 applies if prosecuted.)
- Camp sites are clearly marked.
- $\sqrt{}$ The tracks into the sites are well worn and quite noticeable.
- $\sqrt{}$ Caravan parts and facilities are available in nearby towns.
- K V SELF REGISTRATION POINTS are generally located inside the park near the information signs.
 - SALE OUTLETS are able to provide you with permits, such as National Parks and Wildlife SA and many local businesses.

FIRE DANGER SEASON is 1st November to 30th April and not wood fires are permitted. (Fines up to \$8,000 or imprisonment for a maximum term of 2 years.)

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NON FIRE DANGER SEASON is 1st May to 31st October but KKKKKKKKKKK D D please remember that collection of wood from parks is prohibited to conserve native timer and the habitats of small animals, insects, reptiles and birds. So please bring your own wood, always ensure that you construct a fire at least 4 metres away from any vegetation and that when the fire is alight you must stay with it and have sufficient water or other extinguishing agents to put the fire out.

- No Pets are allowed in the Coorong National Park.
- Take your rubbish home with you.

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Tim's Tech Corner

Don't you hate it. Driving at night, following another car, you pull out to pass, wind up the little diesel, over take and flick to high beam; and you wish you had done something about those headlights. Due to ADR Laws (Australian Design Regulations), manufacturers are restricted to the type and power of vehicle headlights. Now we all know that any modification from standard to our vehicle in the eyes of the law is illegal, but for off-road use, we the 4WDrivers, are less restricted.

As with any electrical "add-on" the first question is whether my alternator can cope with the additional load? Check your manual or specification sheet or even try reading the alternator specification on the unit itself. Most late model cars have 60-100 amp alts factory and plenty of allowance for add-ons. Secondly, just chucking in 100/80 headlight globes to your existing 60/55 semi-sealed lamp unit isn't always a cheap alternative. 100 watts = approx 9 amps 60 watts = approx 5 amps.

Manufacturers only have to design switches and wiring to cope with original current loads. Upgrading your globe size could result in an expensive mistake with burnt out switches or overheated wiring looms and plugs.

Today there are many options:

1 Headlight upgrade loom & relay kits. Then you can slap in your 100/80's. (By the way 100/80 watt is 100 watt high/80 watt low beam, a great combination, other combinations are 100/55, 140/100, 130/90, 60/55).

2 Leave the vehicle standard and try a new globe. Still 60/55, but acclaimed 30% brighter, utilising zenon gas in the globe instead of halogen, called Plus 30's. Don't forget to ensure all globes that you replace in your late model vehicle, especially those with plastic lenses, you must use UV filtered globes, so as not to destroy the plastic lens.

Bolt on spot lights. Great on high beam, but what happens when you dip back to low is something like switching back to parkers. Spot lights, unless good quality, can vibrate, break off, get stolen and are a continued annoyance always having to be adjusted. (They can also let in water – hey Tim!)

Remember, Proper Preparation Prevents Piss Poor Performance.

So next time you are driving through the night to get to your destination the next day, think! Can my headlights be improved? Could this drive be safer with better quality lights?
