MARNE RIVER GORGE TRIP

SUNDAY 10TH SEPTEMBER 2000

After much deliberation it was decided to winch the discovery free backwards, hoping the rock would roll clear, luckily it did and with the rock cleared out the way we were on our way again. Until we came across a rather slippery exit through a gateway. Some people made it through only just missing the gate posts and some had to be towed through, unlike myself being pushed through by man power.

We continued on along more tracks and water crossings thinking we would be at Mt Torrens soon for morning tea as we were all feeling a little hungry. HELP!!! There is still a need for more marshalls, helpers and prize donations needed for the 2001 Clayton Raft Race. See Mark Moss if you can help in any way.

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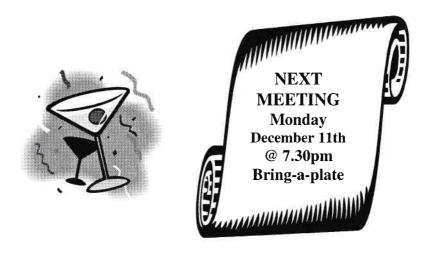

General Motors vs. Microsoft

At the last general meeting it was mentioned that a new 4WD driver-training course was being formulated and that the current course accreditation had expired. The driver-training unit has been able to extend the accreditation of the old course and has issued the following notice.

"After application to the accreditation & Registration Council by the DTU, the courses we know as the Basic and Advanced Courses (National Course Code 7534) have been extended to the 31st of December 2000. There will be NO FURTHER EXTENSIONS. This was granted to allow the large number of club members who have commenced the course to complete this training and be issued with the appropriate certificate/s. Please be fully aware, this extension is granted for existing students only – there are to be no new enrolments for this course. On the 31st of December, the existing course codes 7534 and 7535 (Occupational 4WD) will be deleted from the state and National registers.

All existing students are to be made aware that should they not complete this training by the 31st of December 2000, they must then comply with the transitional arrangements, which will be advised at a later date. All completed training will be given a Credit Transfer to the new course which will be offered from the 1st of January 2001, and please be aware that any qualifications already completed or training already assessed as competent, is not required to be done again. All training from the 1st of January 2001 will be under the new course curriculum, and all competencies in that course with exception of items eligible for Credit Transfer, must be completed by all students."

For all members who wish to complete the current course and be issued with a certificate, please notify me on which components that are still required to be assessed by Sunday the 19th of November, as venues and assessors will be difficult to organise before the 31st of December.

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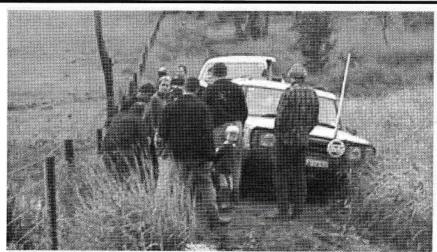

BLINMAN – FLINDERS RANGES October Long Weekend

This trip report is sponsored by an anonymous tyre company – If you only shred two tyres a year – it's a good year!

It appears as though the trip report allocation rules have changed again so I copped it being the only vehicle owner without a radio. Craig kindly supplied me with a hand-held, but not until Sunday.

Most of the crew set of from Adelaide on Friday morning and arrived in convoy at Blinman at around 5pm to pick up stragglers. Then it was off to set up camp on the Angorichina property about 15km east of Blinman. I had driven, without incident, through Bunyeroo, Brachina and Parachilna Gorges earlier in the day to take some dust free photos. I then managed to stake a tyre immediately upon arriving at the camp ground. No problem – single female surrounded by an abundance of blokes eager to display their mechanical prowess. The tyre was changed, firewood was collected, dinners were cooked, another convoy arrived just after dark then most settled around the camp fire for some cleansing ales.

Saturday morning arrived all too soon – aren't kids great?! Craig and Christian made several valiant attempts to plug my offending tyre. We learned a lot but eventually it was deemed to be a throw away by the experts at Angorichina Village and a replacement was provided courtesy of the same tyre sponsor. (I'm a slow learner!)

I arrived back at camp just in time to join the convoy on the Angorichina Station 4WD track, which was to include a "hill" climb. The drive was generally easy going with nothing too steep and no water around to bother us. We stopped to look at a tree bearing historic graffiti, drove up a rocky creek bed and then had a short walk to look for non-existent water and rock wallabies.

The next nature stop was at the bottom of a small hill, so ruck sacks and cameras were grabbed and off we went. Strangely though, the track skirted around the small hill to reveal a somewhat more imposing Patawarta Hill standing at a mere 1015m! The expedition lost several members just above base camp, joined successively by more as the air thinned. About a dozen made it to the top including our illustrious leader, Greg, and many of the kids. It was well worth the climb to see the views out to Lake Torrens, Wilpena Pound and beyond.

We scrambled back down to the vehicles then drove off to some old station ruins for a late lunch. The track back to camp was a little tedious due to the abundance of small rocks and dry water crossings, which did not provide any challenges but hindered speed.

About half of the group were rounded up by Greg after a short rest at camp. We headed east on the Wirrealpa Road then turned off on the Mt Carey Sunset Trail, which was much more exciting for drivers than the earlier expedition. When we reached the top of the hill there was a hurricane blowing but again the views were magnificent. Some clouds would have added more colour to the sunset but the slow slide into deeper and deeper orange was well worth the trip.

Spotties were tested on the way back to camp. I'm, sure that "Tool Man" was hoping for fried eyeballs for dinner and I'm surprised that Greg didn't get out of the car in front and

punch his lights out! Assortments of meals were cooked ranging from BBQ's to gourmet camp oven roasts. Then it was back to the camp fire to wash down the dust with beer, red, guinness, whiskey...

Sunday morning we all awoke at the same time as the kids, strangely enough. We had greater expectations of the Mt Samuel Trek and were not to be disappointed. I think we headed through Blinman into Glass Gorge but no one, apart from Greg and family, could see anything but dust. I was given a radio and I have never heard so much drivel in all my life! I guess they (radios) are useful in emergencies. The 4WD track proved far more exciting than any of Saturday's experiences. We actually got to lock hubs and use the vertically challenged gear stick. Discovery drivers probably resorted to various traction and descent control buttons while they found something better to do with their arms and legs.

There were steep ascents and descents and a little trepidation upon entering Mt Buggery Creek. Surprisingly, I didn't bugger up any tyres and it was noted the ease with which the Hilux vehicles managed this section. There were large rocks to traverse, tight turns to negotiate and rather imposing boulders and scratchy bushes to avoid on the creek sides. Out in the open there were spectacular views of the two Mt Samuels in the ABC Range, the Heysen and Oratunga Ranges and many a prickly pear were spotted. One anonymous passenger was so taken with the scenery that she felt it necessary to perch on top of a roof rack — what was it she said earlier about kids and seatbelts?

Greg turned out to be a champion reptile catcher with the lizards amusing the kids and his antics entertaining his more mature followers. He declined an invitation to grab a brown snake for the photographers. We wound our way back via Parachilna Gorge and a dash for the showers ensued.

Sunday nights campfire was stoked by Darren, who will be furthermore known as "Pyro". Several surrounding pine trees were blistered along with about two dozen innocent bystanders. Craig earned a reputation as a kid magnet around the fire, no doubt helped by his earlier antics on the rope swing. I can't remember what time I went to bed but the fire was still raging.

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WELCOME TO



Nothing annoys me more than driving a car at night with poor headlights.

I had a customer come in today with 130/90 watt globes in his main headlights.

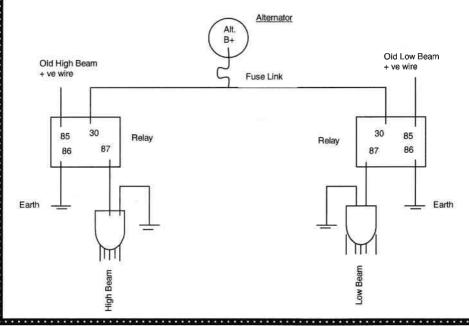
They might as well be candles. High wattage globes are a waste of time if voltage drop is present. That is if the charging voltage at the battery is say 14v and at the globe when turned on is only 11 volts this constitutes voltage drop.

The way to fix this is by correctly installing relays to the headlight wiring, as show in previous issues.

By using a relay you can supply your 130/90 watt globes with system charge and get the best from your globes.

Most effective method is to supply your relay pin 30 directly from your alternator via a fusible link. Not a fuse.

Wiring this way could be risk if not adequately protected so be 100% sure of your wiring....And if confidence alludes you please seek professional advice.
