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Tim's Tech Corner

I had a customer come into the workshop the other week complaining of his dual battery system not performing correctly. Upon initial glance I noticed both batteries were identical SLI (starting, lighting, ignition) batteries, of a recognisable brand, but more or less incorrectly chosen. From past discussions it always returns to what the manufacturer recommends. <u>Always use Deep Cycle Batteries</u> where possible. In the situation of completely discharging the auxillary battery the SLI battery will always fail prematurely.

To make matters worse, the auxillary battery charge circuit wiring was completely (and I might add – innocently) incorrect!

All of the auxillary take offs were on the main starting battery and the solenoid that joined the Aux battery (of which had no aux take offs) was ignition fed.

Which in English means, if they left their fridge on overnight, discharging their main SLI battery, in the morning there is not enough power in the battery to energise the solenoid to join the aux battery to start the vehicle – a bit Irish!

Luckily they can use jumper leads to self jump start themselves but it kinda defeats the purpose.

To add fuel to the fire, another flaw with energising a dual battery solenoid with an ignition feed is that you will always be starting your vehicle off of two batteries and might never know if one is faulty...until it's to late.

A dual battery system is ideally designed to give one the convenience of DC Auxillary power and to avoid discharging the main battery and thus disabling the vehicle.
