

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
### AGM - May Meeting - 13 May 2002 Pizza Night

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
### Go-Kart Racing (Again) — Later 2002

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### Beachport Weekend – Australia Day 2002

### SATURDAY TRIP to ROBE via the Beaches

It started off just like any other trip, with a convoy of vehicles making their way from the Caravan Park, through Beachport, to the coast, where we would take some off road tracks to Robe.

Never having done this before, it was going to be a new experience for me, and was just a little apprehensive about what I was in for. We just followed on behind the leader, along the small track that led us to the biggest sandhill I have seen that cars drive over. However, I was to find out the next day that this was not true.

All the vehicles went through the clearing and some of the people who had been there before went straight to the top. Being the greenhorn of the group (Bull Winkle) decided to park off to the side and watch to see how it was done, besides I had two screaming kids in the back seat saying 'they were not going up that hill, no way, forget it'. Just then 'Rhino' went for it with some gusto, in an attempt to make it to the top of steep section. Bouncing over a rock ledge, just before reaching the base of the sandhill, 'Rhino' made a spectacular climb of the sandhill. It was soon found that the vehicle sustained damage, requiring the engine to shut off immediately. Two others of the group towed 'Rhino' out of the sandhills, back to Beachport, to get whatever repairs were required done so that they could return to Adelaide for a wedding the next day. It was disappointing to see them go home, considering they had left Adelaide at 4am that very day, just to go driving for the day with the group, and went out in the first 30 mins.

After this excitement, we were on our way to Robe through some twisty and sometimes tight tracks. Every time there was that familiar sound of trees scraping the side of the car, I got the 'I told you so' look from the co-pilot, which I ignored, and just looked straight ahead. There was silence from the family as we tilted to her side going around some of the corners, and over some of the rocks, However, this came back to haunt me the next day. It seemed like it was my turn to lean to-wards the wife to stop the car from tipping, to which I was told 'see, you don't like it'.

There were a lot of other clubs doing the tracks at the Beachport this day as well as ourselves, causing some delays, however it all went smoothly from here on. There was a good decision mode the night before, to split the whole group into two groups of a dozen cars each, which assisted us getting past a lot of the other groups reasonably quickly. Who said a good decision couldn't be made after happy hour!

The first beach driving there was another group that was bogged and caused a delay, which enabled the two that towed 'Rhino' out, to rejoin our group. The sand was very soft, and we soon letting more air out of our tyres, some as low as 10lb. This is when the 'River Rats' tried to push in, and got stuck, however Shaun said 'you are only classed as stuck, if someone else has to pull you out' – quote of the day. All I know is, when I passed, he was having four guys push him back and forth, whom he said later went walk about, and he managed to get free himself. Well done 'River Rats'.

By this time it was getting around lunchtime and we parked on Nora Creina beach for lunch. This was a great sheltered cove with lots of people enjoying the sunshine. It also enabled the kids to have a swim and just much around in the sand. What we just drove through and saw along the beach, the rocks, little coves, wildlife, and secluded places justifies the purchase of a four-wheel drive, well that's what I told my wife.

After lunch we were soon on our way through more scrub and tracks that were rough at times with protruding rocks and rolly-polly dips that I was sure this was going to get my daughter car-sick, but to my amazement, she held it all together. You would think that after 150km she would relax just a small bit.

This section was fairly sedate with some more beach driving along Stinky Beach and before you knew it, you were in the sandhills driving around rocky outcrops and through overgrown scrub up one sandhill, and down to the next, but it was great fun.

There was however one more fairly large sandhill to get up to get to Robe and although it was soft, only two or three cars had trouble, because they still had too much pressure in the tyres. (Tip of the day – have a good tyre gauge)

We all pulled over on the side of the road in Robe, and while some of us were reinflating tyres, others drove back to Beachport via the beaches. I was one of those who drove back via the tarmac, meaning we would be back in time to get a headstart on Happy Hour.

Overall it was a very pleasant day, and a large learning curve for me to see just what you can do in a four-wheel drive. I just have to gain some experience now and try to convince the 'trouble and strife' to have a go.




