



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

MAKING TRACKS

Track closures, it seams that we are hearing more and more about them and being greeted by them more often, whilst out enjoying this beautiful land. So what can the 4wdrive community do, to try and help keep tracks open, for all of us to enjoy?

Well, in South Australia (and every other state/territory for that matter) there are lots of initiatives going on to help organisations such as the National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) and The Department for Environment and Heritage (DEH), keep tracks and parks open.

A prime example of this is the twice yearly interclub working bee at the Ngarkat Conservation Park on the SA border with Victoria. This park covers some 270,000 ha of native vegetation and is home to the 'Border Track', which follows the border fence South over the sand dunes from Pinnaroo.

The latest working bee was held on the last weekend in April and attracted some 70 volunteers, with 40 vehicles, from 12 clubs. Although the weather conditions were not favourable, a number of tasks were completed. These included the closing/fencing off of minor detours, implementing changes to the track to assist in park re-vegetation, opening sections of the original border track, as well as setting up track monitoring sites and a new camp site at Hensley's Trig Point.

The weekend gives participants a great insight into what the NPWS & DEH do on a daily bases in our national parks. It also lets these bodies know, that the majority of 4wdrivers are interested in looking after and protecting local tracks and National Park. Indeed, Senior Park Ranger for the Mallee area, Donna Nussio said that the work carried out on Saturday was equivalent to five or six of her weekend patrols and that the working bees were invaluable in keeping the tracks open.

Some clubs in SA have undertaken other special projects, including the Nissan Patrol Club's long standing beach clean up and maintenance weekends at the 28-Mile Crossing Track in the Coorong National Park.

Further up the coast, the Toyota Landcruiser Club maintain the 42-mile crossing into the same park. They have also restored an isolated outstation in the Innamincka region of the states far north.

Kudriemitchie Outstation is situated over 1100 km North of Adelaide and has been slowly restored (to allow it to be used by 4wd association members and park staff) since 1995, after a group of club members discovered that the building was going to be destroyed.

Ongoing working bees over the years have resulted in the outstation obtaining a new long drop toilet, water tanks, and basic kitchen and barbeque facilities, with items such as window and door frames being replaced due to the ravages of the local white-ant colonies.

So if you are interested in the conservation of your local tracks or National Park, then contact your nearest NPWS or DEH branch and engage their help in organising a working bee. The environment (and the authorities) will love you for it.



Ngarkat Working Bee is here again!

Doesn't time fly? It seems like only yesterday when we were slipping and sliding our way into Pine Hut Soak campground to undertake the

April working bee on the Border Track!

This time around we have a completely different challenge for you, literally helping a campsite "raise from the ashes".

The Box Flat Campsite, on the Western side of the Park (off the Baan Hill Track) was a favourite camping location for visitors for many years. Being a natural soak, the area was a cool oasis in the middle of "the desert", teeming with wildlife and shaded by beautiful Eucalypts. Unfortunately, the campsite was hit hard by the January 2005 fires, and hit again (even harder!) by the January 2006 fires.

Due to the public risk hazard from falling trees and limbs, the decision was made to close the campsite until it could be made safe again.

Now, this is where you come in! The staff in the Murraylands region would like some help in reopening this wonderful campsite. It's going to be a big job, and we will need assistance to lop trees and limbs, reinstate (and remake!) fencing and furniture, clearing away an old exclosure and fallen trees, installing new fire rings as well as many other smaller jobs. If conditions are right, we may even get to do some of the banksia spreading that didn't quite take off in April!

The campsite may not be as beautiful as before the fire went through, but don't let that put you off!

Box Flat is still a pleasant place to visit, and we will provide a toilet for those who don't want to "rough it" completely.

The staff of the Murraylands region would like to thank you in advance for your assistance in getting this campsite open again, as well as all the help you have provided in past years.


