of member attendance at club meetings and criteria for membership acceptance, welcome visitors and link them with a buddy, run the club night raffle and pay for any birthday drinks.

Website officer: - Maintain and update MLR website and Facebook administration.

Merchandise officer: - Organises clothing and other club approved merchandise for sale to members.

Property Officer: - Looks after club property and trailer, by maintaining where appropriate and lends equipment out to members.

Education Officer: - Organises club training and awareness days. Liaises with 4WDSA Driver Training Unit for wider training opportunities.

Magazine editor: - Collates all material to go into club magazine - photos, trip reports, jokes, interesting 4WD related stories sourced elsewhere. Facebook administration.

1315 Group picture - and then on the road. A nice sunny day.

1600 Set up camp at Hancocks Lookout - off Horrocks Pass Rd

DAY 2


0800 A windy night and morning so broke camp without breakfast cooking.

Straight to Pt Augusta for toasted sangers and coffee!

Onwards to Ceduna. Storm hit – so simple solution STRAIGHT TO THE PUB!

Then set up camp at Thick Trees hidden road-side camp.

Welcome campfire.







DAY 3

0800 RATs taken and negative result picture with drivers licence messaged to Maralinga - to comply with strict COVID entry requirements.

On the road again, travelling West along the Eyre Highway.Near Colona homestead, turned North up the Ooldea Road.

At the railway line encountered a massive concrete truck a few wheel-barrow loads in there!

1430 Arrived at the Maralinga Village securely locked gate.Local staff opened up for us and we set up camp.

Plenty of firewood supplied daily.

Wild dingos wandered around our camp. Beautiful animals but thieved any item they could from cars etc.













DAY 4

0900 Local tour staff collected us and others in their bus and spent all day thoroughly explaining the (sometimes sad) history of Maralinga, and the various sites.

We were shown:-

The fresh-rain-water pond which is heavily filtered for the village requirements. The pond is fed from run-off from the large runway apron, and is filled after only a few millimetres of rain.

The impressive air strip, not requiring any maintenance since the 1950s.

The only surviving "clean" troop carrier showing the air-tight "submarine" locked door to protect occupants.





DAY 4 cont.

The various Ground Zero sites - Taranaki, Breakaway and Marcoo.

Enormous mounds of dirt under which untold quantities and value of "dirty" equipment, vehicles and bulldozers etc etc were buried.

Local indigenous people have warning signs to indicate eg OK to eat animals in an area but not able to camp there.

A most informative tour by Priscilla who has spend years researching and providing the historic tour information with many photographs for all to view.







Maralinga - Days 5 to 9

Lloyd reporting from Maralinga to Googs Track/Mt Ive/Home

Day 5 - Maralinga to Ceduna

After a casual start to the day we left Maralinga at 10am to make our way back to Ceduna. Unfortunately Henry hadn't been well from the start of the trip and wasn't improving so decided to make his way home from this point which was a pity, but glad he made it to Maralinga to have a look around and come on the tour with us.

We stopped at the monument showing the joining from east and west of the Trans Australian railway. From there we headed to Ceduna for re-stocking, refuelling and general preparation for Googs Track and beyond. Burgo met up with his dirt biking friend Karen who would be joining us for the remainder of the trip on her motorbike. We all met at the pub had a pre-dinner drink before sitting down for a non-camp meal which was a nice change, especially the Smoky Bay oysters... yum!!. After dinner Paula, myself, Ron & Michelle headed back to our roadside camp 10kms out of Ceduna while Burgo & Karen stayed in the caravan park for the night.

Now let's quickly talk about Karen. Karen can be best described as someone with a larger than life personality and all I can say is she is perfect campfire company with plenty of great stories/jokes to tell and she made sure there were plenty of laughs around the campfire for the remainder of the trip. We all thoroughly enjoyed her company. There is nothing better than hearing laughter around the campfire when out in the bush.







Day 6 - Googs Track

After the planned 9.30am coffee stop/rendevous at Ceduna OTR we headed off with blue skies and sunshine plus the obligatory wind which had been an issue since day 1. After airing down Karen set off on her bike while we followed behind at our own pace. After some overnight rain the driving was relatively straight forward with the sand a bit firmer. All was going well until we came across one particular dune where Karen had gotten stuck with her bike, but luckily was was at the top telling us this one will need a bit more right foot. Up and over we all went and the fun continued. A bit further on one particular dune caught us out but with a bit of digging we managed to get moving again, slowly but surely, I was impressed with how the new Prado managed that situation without any other recovery gear needed.

We made it to Googs Lake for lunch and then headed east on the Childara Rocks track towards. Nalara Rocks for the night. The going was tight and twisty, especially for the big yellow truck, but it was a nice drive out to the rocks. Karen was ahead of us on her bike and once we caught up found out she had come off a couple of times but she was having fun. We found a sheltered spot out of the wind to camp and went exploring. The rocks are a granite outcrop with indentations all over them which capture the rain water and the aborigines used these as a water source. There was a mix of tadpoles, dead emus, bones and flowers amongst the rock pools. Another nice night was spent around the campfire before a very guiet & peaceful night's sleep in the outback.





Day 7 - Googs Track

First thing this morning we headed further east to Lake Everard station, where we had organised approval to go to Childara Well. This was a fantastic piece on bush ingenuity where they had built a rock wall around the edge of the granite rock to capture all the water which was then directed to a huge man made well, definitely worth the drive out for a look.

It was then back west to Googs Lake for lunch. Again the sun was out with blue skies and finally no wind. After lunch it was off to Mt Finke for the night, a total of 88kms away and unfortunately the going was a bit slower than anticipated so we got to camp a bit later than planned. Despite this it was a great night around the fire where it was "gourmet sausage" night which was enjoyed by all.





Day 8 - Googs Track to Bush Camp

Mt Finke is a great campground at the base of Mt Finke, after recent rains the desert was covered in a myriad of different flowers which were very pretty against the red dirt and rocks of the outback. I was up early and climbed to the top of Mt Finke for sunrise where the view of the surrounding area made me realise we were in pretty remote country and it was such a beautiful spot.

We left camp at 10am with a plan to get to Kingoonya for lunch before camping just south of Kingoonya on the way to Mt Ive. As we made our way to the top of Googs Track we came across a lovely patch of Sturt Desert Peas, which we all took the opportunity to get some photos. Despite carrying extra petrol on her bike, and on the front of Burgo's troopy, Karen didn't have enough petrol to get to Kingoonya. Luckily she had some reception at Mt Finke and had managed to organise through her Dad to get some petrol from Wilgena Station before Kingoonya. Burgo and Karen took off to get the fuel while we were happily cruising along at 80km/h on the Trans Australian Railway road which was in excellent condition.

Despite our best efforts we didn't make it to Kingoonya before the kitchen closed at 2pm. We decided to do the next best thing which was to sit outside in the sunshine and enjoy a beer at this great little outback pub. After relaxing in the sun we decided to make our way to camp for early nibbles in lieu of lunch.









We travelled approx. 25kms south of Kingoonya where we found a great clearing amongst lots of trees with plenty of firewood. Nibbles were enjoyed while we got the fire roaring ready for pizza night compliments of the trip leader. We enjoyed a stunning outback sunset with no wind and after more laughs around the campfire, pizza was enjoyed by all cooked in the camp ovens. A beautiful night in the outback was enjoyed and another peaceful night's sleep was the perfect end to a great day.

Day 9 - Bush Camp to Mt Ive

With only a short drive into Mt Ive on the cards for today, it was another casual morning around camp. We hit the track at 10am and had a lovely drive through beautiful outback scenery on great roads. We ended up on the western side of Lake Gairdner for lunch where we had a good look around and were trying to work out if it was water on the lake we could see on the horizon or just an illusion. Ron contemplated putting up the drone to answer this but the wind had picked up again, and more so out on the lake, so decided against it. We stopped to grab some great wood off the side of the road before pulling into Mt Ive at around 3pm. We sat down at the bar and enjoyed a few drinks while picking the brains of the caretakers if there were any campsites with some shelter from the wind. The short answer was no. so we ended up having a couple more drinks before heading out to our bush camp and find some shelter amongst the trees.



Burgo and Karen decided to grab the luxury of a room out of the wind for the night, but did join us for dinner around the fire. It was a great night with plenty of laughs and a nice big fire to keep us warm.

It was eventually time for bed and despite our best efforts to get out of the wind there was no escape from the 60km/h wind howling down the valley at Mt Ive all night long. The original plan was to go out and have a look at the eastern side of Lake Gairdner with the hope of seeing some water in the lake. After limited sleep overnight and the forecast for more wind, we woke up in the morning coming to the conclusion that wind and canvas don't make a good combination and decided to make our way home, Ron and Michelle decided to join us and head home also. Burgo and Karen would stay on and go and look at the lake before heading home the next day.

We all said our goodbyes and reflected on a fantastic week away with great people, great scenery, great weather (despite the wind) and great fun had by all. Without any mechanical issues and pretty much plain sailing for all it made for a very enjoyable trip.

From my perspective I would highly recommend anyone who get the chance to do a tour at Maralinga do so. It was a fascinating place with so many stories that I was totally oblivious to and now have a much better understanding of what went on up there. The tour operators were outstanding well worth the cost of the tour.



Rob & Trish Our Half Oz Trip Third month out of possibly six

With 8,600 kms behind us Exmouth was stop No. 29, we spent 9 days there.

You gotta go to Coral Bay a highlight of the Ningaloo Reef, although, we were told "don't bother". There we're no free bookings, not much else within cooee. Researched and found a coastal campground called



Bruboodjoo, a single 10km sand/limestone hilly track off the main highway, 70km return trip to visit Coral Bay. \$80/week or \$20/night. Caretaker takes the cash and says "find a spot" but if the grass is too high he provides a whipper snipper so you can trim your chosen spot. Popular fishing spot for the Western Australians, so many there, at night it looked like a city. Only amenity is a dump point, thank God for that. It was very windy early in the morning till late arvo.

Just as the brochure says crystal clear turquoise water on pure white sand is what greets you at Coral Bay. Small but a quaint place, holiday homes on the beach frontage must be

worth a fortune. Visited the bakery, you just have to devour something delicious. Booked a glass bottom boat tour for the afternoon. Marine tour guide advised coral spawned last March, the wind turned NW and sadly the spawning killed off a lot of coral. 16,000 fish lost! There were small bits of colour and some fish, this area of Ningaloo has dense coral structures with stag horn and huge cabbage shapes. Probably won't recover for 20 years. This put a dampener on our snorkelling.





We visited Carnarvon and whilst there drove out to the blow holes, they were awe inspiring. A cheap campground there (one that you can't book)! with an amazing snorkelling lagoon, but yet again our timing was not in sync to stay. We checked out Quobba Station. Enjoyed what Carnarvon had to offer and caught up with a couple of WA people we met in Exmouth

Hamelin Pool was a single stopover, a cute little park set up from the original telegraph station town and run by 2 little ladies. Feature here was the stromatalites which we could only view from the beach as the jetty had been badly damaged by cyclone Seroja.







Also the shell brick quarry dating back to 1884.

Shark Bay was a mere 128km drive, we had a 4 day stop in Denham. Visited Shell Beach, Monkey Mia and The Aquarium. Did a 4wd trip in the Francois Peron National Park to Cape Peron driving with lots of momentum through soft sandy sections & mogells. There is an air station before you start, with a large info board that reads "don't get bogged", yes, we almost did & where are the maxtrax? Fixed to the back of the caravan which is not in tow!

A very inticing little restaurant called Old Pearler made from shell bricks had BYO with no corkage fee (must be the only one in Oz). We had a belated anniversary dinner there. The owner was the chef who took pride in his meals and service and did it alone on the night we dined because of covid affected staff.

We heard so much about station stays and managed to book into Worramel Station. Worramel River which is massive flows from beneath and rarely flows on top, they have 4 artesian tubs, we had a good soak in them. There is so much metal in the water it turns

white to red, you wouldn't want to be wearing Seafolly bathers! Very organised with a Cafe, dinner meals 3 times/week and entertainment. We also did a self drive 4wd tour of the property. All the lucky kids doing a lap of Oz with parents had a grand time playing in the sandy riverbed.

From there it was a 326km drive to Kalbarri. (that's a hard day for us). You can visit the national park and do a quick hike to visit the "must see" skywalk". Two platforms perched right on the cliff top extending out over the gorges of the Murchison River. Nature's window is another phenomenon. There is such an array of wild flowers and native flowering trees it would be incredible to see this in spring. We opted to stay in Kalbarri itself, yet another tourist attraction along the WA coast. We witnessed courageous surfies riding waves very close to rocky shelves, saw whales breaching out in the distant blue waters and admired the views from the 100m high red cliffs. A swift cold front headed in which brought wind and showers, out came the warm thick jackets. We also caught up with Ian & Delma for a coffee which was nice.









A scenic beachside drive and then through the wheatbelt area and green pastures on the way to Geraldton looked just like the Adelaide Hills. A visit to the museum saw us reading amazing stories about all the shipwrecks in this region, including HMAS Sydney. There are unreal authentic models of ships in glass cases, I can't imagine the hours of work involved. This town has a superb HMAS Sydney memorial which we visited.

Cervantes was a quick stopover just to enable us to to see The Pinnacles, limestone structures of all shapes and sizes which have taken 30,000 years to form. You can drive your 4wd on the designated track. There are several stops to take photos. Day after we visited it was closed due to rain.

We opted to take the coast road from Cervantes to South Fremantle to avoid Perth freeways. This was a 223km drive, the dark clouds appeared with heavy showers. The winter clothes are being donned! OMG is that nice warm weather only a memory now?

The plan for our 7 day stay in South Fremantle was to set up the full annexe, well, that went out the window, couldn't put the awning out due to... yes, wind, same for everyone else. You could feel the richness of the history in Freo, beautiful old buildings, cafes and pubs, there from the day dot, all looking pristine. Trained it in from Freo to Perth and saw the sights, Kings Park with Perth on the Swan River just fabulous, hey, what a city!

Being past boaties, we were in awe of the size of the Freo Yacht Club, how much wealth is floating and in hard storage there? Visited the Maritime & Shipwreck museums. There she is in all her glory Australia II, winner of the 1983







America's Cup. Not one picture or accolade for Bondie. We were in the firing line, the 3 fronts heading for Perth were fierce. The wind felt cyclonic so we dropped the pop top on the caravan. 10 metre waves off Rottnest Island, anyone for a ferry ride? South West Coast touring cancelled from our agenda, damn, rain and more rain.







Headed for the sun in Kalgoorlie with a 1 night stay in Southern Cross. Lovely old buildings, a pub on every corner. Museum was history of the gold rush days, very interesting. Visited the super pit lookout, a tourist attraction which gives an opportunity to view a working mine. The heavy dump trucks looked like matchbox toys. Glad we visited Kal that's what the locals say. We dearly wanted to explore Esperance, it poured with rain from Norseman on, flooded when we arrived.

Not a very large town, the draw card is the coastline. Drove to Cape Le Grand and Lucky Bay. Excellent set ups for campgrounds. Have you ever seen tiled floors in a long drop toilet?

Solar hot showers too - jaw dropping stuff!

Very white fine silicone sand delivers the clearest seawater you've ever seen, and the turquoise blue is something else. Tourist drive of the western side was full of large bays just as beautiful.

That was stop No. 40.





Departed and headed for The Nullabor with 3 separate freebie stops along the way, yes, trying to stay ahead of the weather. Drove into sights along the bight, the fog set in, thank God we managed a couple of decent photos beforehand. Oh dear, reality hit when we saw the Welcome to SA sign, we're heading home, not sure of how that's really going to feel.





Historic Car Registry



A 90 day conditional registration scheme For Historic, Left Hand Drive and Street Rod vehicles.

Members of Mount Lofty Rangers 4WD Club are eligible for Club Registration of Historic, Left Hand Drive and Street Rod vehicles through the club.

- Inspect vehicle and make sure it meets the criteria for Club Registration.
 If previously registered bring current registration information including current permits for modified vehicles.
- Complete MR334 form and original to owner and copy retained by Mount Lofty Rangers 4WD Club
- 3. Log book supplied to vehicle owner and explanation of the use.
- 4. Record and retain a copy of MR334, Certificate of Exemption and Statutory Declaration if needed.
- Record the Log book Serial Number on the Certificate of Registration along with the date of issue, the Club Stamp and sign the certificate.
 Retain Copy of Registration papers as proof car was registered at log book issue.
