Keep reading for a brief description of each role:

President: - Convenes all meetings of MLR. Meeting with 4WDSA to push the MLR interests. Sponsor Liaison.

Vice President: - Facilitate monthly topic of interest e.g. guest speakers, awareness sessions etc. Becomes acting President when the President unavailable. MLR club registration officer.

Treasurer: - Looking after club financials. Sponsor liaison.

Secretary & Public Officer: - Minute taking for meetings. Correspondence in and out.

Trips Coordinator: - Primary point of contact for members trip planning, advice and attendance sheets. Communicates trip calendar to members.

4WDSA Delegate: - Attends bi-monthly 4WDSA meetings and is the voice of MLR, also reports back on any relevant information from 4WDSA that affects MLR.

Membership officers (1 lead & 2 x assistants): - First point of contact for visitors that come to MLR, keep track

of member attendance at club meetings and criteria for membership acceptance, welcome visitors and link them with a buddy, run the club night raffle and pay for any birthday drinks.

Website officer: - Maintain and update MLR website and Facebook administration.

Merchandise officer: - Organises clothing and other club approved merchandise for sale to members.

Property Officer: - Looks after club property and trailer, by maintaining where appropriate and lends equipment out to members.

Education Officer: - Organises club training and awareness days. Liaises with 4WDSA Driver Training Unit for wider training opportunities.

Magazine editor: - Collates all material to go into club magazine – photos, trip reports, jokes, interesting 4WD related stories sourced elsewhere. Facebook administration.

Committee Member: - Supports other Officers of the committee, and helps with club events and trips where needed. If you would like to share your experience and contribute to the running of the club, please speak to a current committee member to obtain a nomination form.

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The Club's aim is for its members to enjoy all aspects of owning and using our 4WDs while enjoying the diverse surroundings offered by this great country. We are a club of 4WD enthusiasts who enjoy challenging driving, regular trips, camping, camp cooking and a great social scene on and off track.





Lloyd & Paula's NT & Arnhem Land Adventure Part 2

Day 11: Maguk Campground - Ubirr

Up early again and packed up before it was too hot. We kept heading North into Kakadu stopping at a lookout, cultural centre, billabong and an aboriginal art site before getting to Jabiru for lunch, had a guick look around and not a lot to see, had lunch in the IGA before heading to camp at Merl Campground. Arrived at camp around 2pm, set-up, got the lie of the land and sat around trying to stay cool as it was definitely warm today, the temp was around 34 degrees and reasonably humid. We then went off to see some amazing aboriginal artwork en-route to the Ubirr lookout over Kakadu to watch the sunset. It was very impressive as you slowly climbed up to the high point with expansive views over the landscape. We were guite happy sitting there watching the sun go down and were quite content. After the sun set we went back to camp for dinner and awaited the Armageddon of mozzies that was meant to come. We layered up with Bushmans. lit the fire and had a platter for





dinner. The mozzies were out and about but very bearable luckily. Went to bed at 9pm but it was still extremely warm. We plugged in the fan which provided some relief but it wasn't the best nights' sleep we've had.

Day 12: Ubirr - Jabiru

A very cruisy day today, woke up again to the sounds of lots of tropical birds which is quite different. Packed up again early before going for the short walk to Cahill's Crossing to look at the crocodiles cruising around in the water. It was then into Jabiru to kill some time before checking into the caravan park. We went to the IGA and got a few bits before going into an art gallery, which had some stunning pieces of art. Spent the afternoon



doing a few odd jobs, having a swim and showers before a night off from cooking by having dinner at the poolside bar. A bit or organising for Darwin and a generally relaxing day/night.

Day 13: Jabiru - Darwin

Up for a slow and easy pack-up before heading west towards Darwin. We stopped and looked at a billabong along the way before making it to Darwin by 11am. First port of call was the car wash where everything was given a blast to get rid of the layer of dust. It was then off to the laundromat for some much needed washing, these machines were HUGE! We had some lunch and I went and got some spare parts for the jockey wheel while we waited. After everything was done we checked in at 2pm, settled



in and made ourselves at home before a few drinks on the balcony. It was then lamb cutlets and sausages on the BBQ which was yum before an early night enjoying the benefits of an air conditioned room.

Day 14: Darwin - Day 1

Slept in until just after 7am, which would normally be an early rise but not on this trip. Had coffee and breakfast before heading into town at 9am. Had a wander around the waterfront. had a coffee before having a look through the oil tunnels. It was then out to the Stokes Hill Wharf for the RFDS/Darwin bombing tourist attraction. We easily spent 2 hours in there which was very interesting with loads of info on both things. I have to admit it seems an odd combination of things to have in the same location but there you go. Had lunch on the wharf before realising the gaol was closing at 2pm. We made a mad dash to have a quick look and the lady was nice enough to let us in for 15mins. It was then back to Darwin to have a wander along the esplanade and sit in the shade killing a bit of time before the markets opened. We went down there at 4pm and had a wander around, Paula bought a painted rock from an aboriginal lady who was just trying to make a little bit of money. We were a bit underwhelmed by the markets as we thought there would be more stalls. There seemed to be more food vans than anything else. We had some yummy Mexican chicken for dinner and then had sickly, sweet sorbet for dessert. Overall not the best part of our day. We were ready to head back by this point after a long day, it was a good day without being too stressful but being out in the heat for most of the day has taken it out of us. A few drinks on the balcony before another early night.









Day 15: Darwin - Day 2

A nice cruisy day where we went and did a big re-stock of groceries at Palmerston before going back to the cabin for lunch. It was then off to the art gallery for a look which I really enjoyed but Paula was a bit so-so with. We then went and sat down at the waterfront and relaxed a bit before our sunset cruise, we have both been suffering from a bit of diarrhea and eventually worked out it was due to dehydration. We tried to keep our fluids up today



and felt better for it. It was then time for our cruise which was lovely. The food was great, the wine nice and the company enjoyable. It was a great night out on the water watching the sunset and just what we both needed.

Day 16: Darwin - Day 3

Today we had to be up early to get into town for our WWII tour. The first half of the tour was on the bus going around to some significant sites. The tour guide was an absolute wealth of knowledge and very passionate about the war history of Darwin. It was great to get some more detail about what happened here and when you learn more about the details it makes you appreciate what happened on a different level. Our hearts absolutely go out to the Post Office workers that were killed on that day. The second half of the tour was spent out on the water which gave a different perspective again of what happened that day. After the tour we went back to the cabin and did a bit of organising before heading back into town for dinner at the sailing club. It was a lovely setting to enjoy another lovely Darwin sunset. The food was OK and the wine was nice. After dinner it was back to the cabin for some entertainment in the name of fundraising for The Variety Club before another relatively early night.







Day 17: Darwin - Katherine Gorge

We were up early again for a slow pack up at the cabin before hooking up the camper again for the next leg of camping. We left around 8.30am before stopping at The Lazy Lizard for a coffee and stretch. It was then onto Katherine and the Nitmiluk Info centre to book a tour for tomorrow. After a lovely salad for lunch we found out the tour we want to do is booked out so we will be going canoeing instead... which Paula is thrilled about. As the canoe tour starts relatively early we have decided to stay at a caravan park closer to the gorge than originally



planned. It is a bit more expensive but is quite a nice park and will make things easier tomorrow. Chicken fried rice for dinner and a nice night sitting outside as it is a bit cooler here than what it was in Darwin.

Day 18: Katherine Gorge

After a night where we heard everything including: dogs barking, birds singing, rooster crowing, jet planes flying, people snoring, caravan air conditioners and road noise, it wasn't a great nights sleep but we were up early to be at Nitmiluk for 7.30am ready for our half day canoeing trip in Katherine Gorge. We had a guick run up the first gorge in a boat before we got into our canoes. We canoed up the 2nd gorge but being early, the sun was right in our faces which was making it hard for photos. You could continue into the 3rd gorge but that required getting out and lifting your canoe through to the next gorge. We decided against this as Paula was more than happy to stay in the canoe and not tempt fate having to get out and back in again, plus we figured it would just be more of the same. We turned around and started drifting back with the current and wind assisting. It was nice and peaceful in the gorge as most people continued on while we turned back. As we cruised back we had a good look around and took more photos now the sun was at our backs. We stopped on a small



sandy beach where I got out and had a quick swim, it was nice and refreshing even though it wasn't too hot due to the breeze and staying in the shadows of the gorge. After the tour it was then back to the info centre for another yummy salad lunch and then into Katherine for a few more supplies. It was a case of filling up, including the jerry can, last minute fruit and veg and a couple of other bits before we hit Arnhem Land tomorrow. Hamburgers for dinner and an early night before the adventures start again tomorrow.

Day 19: Katherine - Mainoru Store

This morning was spent leaving camp just after 8am and heading into Katherine for a few last minute supplies before heading in to Arnhem Land. Once we turned off it was nice to have bitumen all the way to Beswick. We stopped and had a look at the art gallery/cultural centre, there was a man named Dave there who showed us through and explained lots of things to us. It was very educational and informative and Dave was very patient to explain different things about aboriginal culture to us. We then had a look through the art gallery which had some very significant pieces on show which we felt privileged to see. Unfortunately is was a "sorry" day in the community due to a recent death. so no-one other than Dave was there to show us through. We bought a canvas from the gallery by a local artist. Norman, which has a nice story attached to it. It was then onto the Jurassic Lookout for lunch which had a great outlook over the countryside. From there it was just over an hour to camp at Mainoru Store, what a lovely spot to stop and spend a night. We had showers, went for a swim and chilled out chatting to fellow travellers all afternoon. It was then up to the store for a couple of huge burgers for dinner. We met a lovely local guy named Peter and had a good chat over dinner. He gave us a few good tips and had a beautiful dog as his companion. After dinner it was back to the hub of activity along the billabong with all the other campers. All in all it was a good, easy day with some nice scenery and not too much stress. We have a longish day in the car tomorrow but if the roads stay as they did today it shouldn't be too bad.



Historic Car Registry

A 90 day conditional registration scheme For Historic, Left Hand Drive and Street Rod vehicles.

Members of Mount Lofty Rangers 4WD Club are eligible for Club Registration of Historic, Left Hand Drive and Street Rod vehicles through the club.

- 1. Inspect vehicle and make sure it meets the criteria for Club Registration. If previously registered bring current registration information including current permits for modified vehicles.
- 2. Complete MR334 form and original to owner and copy retained by Mount Lofty Rangers 4WD Club
- 3. Log book supplied to vehicle owner and explanation of the use.
- 4. Record and retain a copy of MR334, Certificate of Exemption and Statutory Declaration if needed.
- Record the Log book Serial Number on the Certificate of Registration along with the date of issue, the Club Stamp and sign the certificate. Retain Copy of Registration papers as proof car was registered at log book issue.

IF YOU HAVE CLUB REGO PLEASE ENSURE THAT YOUR BOOK IS STAMPED
